Have you seen the FDOC cleaning roster?

Each month, a different group from FDOC is enlisted to clean our club rooms each week. 2-3 people each week need to clear, sweep and mop floors, change bins, wipe surfaces & clean the toilets. This is a quick and easy job when it is shared among our members. Check our notice board for our roster this year and sign up with your coordinator when it is your discipline's month!

Off leash parks are becoming more and more popular and provide an alternative way to exercise your dog without having to pound the pavement. Frankston Dog Obedience Club grounds are available as an off leash dog park when not in use by the Club. Unfortunately, there are increasing reports of accidents and incidents happening to both handlers and dogs at some of these parks so please consider the following points to make sure you and your best friend stay safe when using these facilities.

1) Before taking your dog off leash make sure you have a solid recall. Your dog needs to come back to you 100% of the time, even when distracted by other dogs. If you need help with your recall talk to one of our instructors who will be happy to help you.

2) Don't assume every other dog handler in the park is as responsible as you. Some dog owners are just plain lazy and see an off leash park as an easy way to exercise their dog without any effort. Their dog may not come back when called so be vigilant and stay away from any dogs that you think might be a threat.

3) Entering and exiting the park can be potentially troublesome. Fenced dog parks often only have one gate to enter and exit and dogs can congregate in this area and may cause problems so be extra careful in these areas.

4) Big dogs and small dogs are generally not a good combination. Rough play can result in a small dog being unintentionally hurt by a larger dog, so be vigilant and look after your dog and make sure they are safe.

5) If someone asks you if it is ok for their dog to say hello to your dog and you are concerned that it may not be a good idea, say 'thank-you for asking but not today' and turn and walk away – better to be safe than sorry.

6) Finally, make sure that going to the park is a happy experience for you and your dog; one that you both enjoy and look forward to.

Scan Cards - How & Why?

All of our members have a *unique* QR code in our administration system that allows them to register their attendance at the kiosk each week. This register allows us to monitor numbers on a weekly basis, which is also used for trophy applicants at the end of year presentations to ensure the recipients are active club members. When you scan in, it will also flag with either a “membership recognised” or “membership not recognised” just after the scan - this is to let you know if your membership is *currently financial or not*.

Let's scan in together ...

1. Make sure your scan card is saved on your phone or printed clearly.
2. Turn your phone brightness UP so it is easier for the reader to scan.
3. The kiosk camera is faced towards you and you should be able to see yourself in the screen. Place your scan card in front of the camera about 20cm away, as if you are taking a photo of it.
4. The reader should beep and display the “membership recognised” screen in green *or* “membership not recognised” in red.
5. If you got the green screen, pay your \$3/dog and go enjoy your class!
6. If you got the red screen, pay your \$3/dog and go pay the enrolment officers or secretary a visit in the office to enquire about your membership status.

Quick Tips for Cooperative Dog Nail Trimming

Trimming your dog's nails doesn't have to be a daunting task. By embracing cooperative care techniques, you can make the process calmer and easier for both you and your furry friend. Here are some quick tips to help you achieve successful nail trims:

Familiarize your dog with paw handling:

Get your dog comfortable with having their paws touched by gently massaging and holding them during relaxed moments or playtime. This helps build trust and prepares them for nail trims.

Choose the right tools: Invest in high-quality nail clippers or a grinder designed for dogs. Consult with your veterinarian or a professional groomer to select the most suitable option for your dog's breed and size.

Take it slow and steady: Gradually introduce the clippers by allowing your dog to sniff and investigate them. Use positive reinforcement, such as treats or praise, to create a positive association with the clippers.

Use cooperative care techniques: Incorporate cooperative care measures, such as desensitizing your dog to the sound and sensation of nail trimming. Start by simply touching the nails with the clippers and gradually progress to trimming.

Reward and reinforce positive behavior: Reward your dog with treats, praise, or their favorite toys after each successful nail trimming session. This helps them associate the experience with something positive and makes future trims easier.



Increase frequency gradually: Aim for regular nail trims to maintain optimal nail length. Start with shorter, more frequent sessions rather than infrequent, prolonged ones. This helps your dog become accustomed to the process over time.

Remember, cooperative care and patience are key when it comes to trimming your dog's nails. If you encounter difficulties or have concerns, consult with a professional groomer or your veterinarian for guidance and assistance

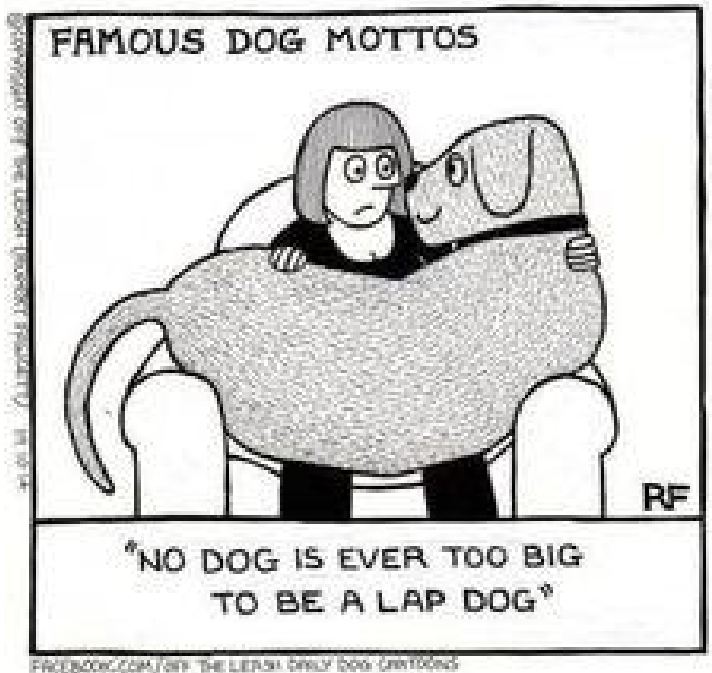

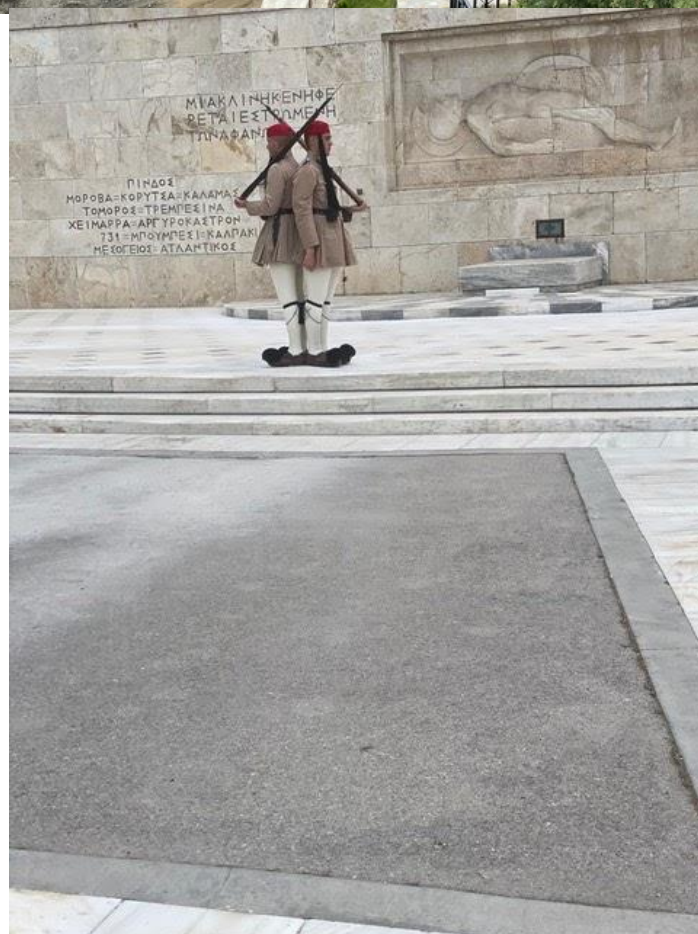

Moving to Ringside Presentations

In past years, our Club Competition Day presentations were held at the very end of all of that discipline's entrants, to mock a presentation of an actual agility, flyball or obedience competition. It was discussed at a recent committee meeting that this method may not be beneficial to our membership, so a solution was developed.

Enter: Ringside Presentations

After the final entrant of a class is complete, the judge has the opportunity to determine placings and qualifications swiftly while the entrants grab a bite to eat or give their dog a walk around. The judge will then return to the ring with all the entrants to discuss the results, hand out qualification cards, and present the class placing. This is with the aim to reduce waiting times, increase presentation attendance, and give the opportunity for the judge to directly address issues or victories with the class.

This change may not alter much for our agility and flyball groups however, implementation will be discussed with those involved.

Ringside presentations will be in place for our next Club Competition Day, October 28. Feedback on this change will be encouraged via our committee or competition officials.
